

It's great fun and a good way to improve their formal writing skills, which is what the students are currently studying in English. We hope The First Years are enjoying this opportunity and that this experience benefits them greatly in future.

Second Years

The Second Year French classes have also been communicating with penpals from some schools in France, organised by the French Teachers. The aim of the penpals is to improve both the Irish students' French skills and the French students' English skills in an unorthodox way. They do this by writing letters to improve sentence structure and vocabulary. One of the French teachers, Ms Doocey has a friend from Picardie, France, Mr Vincent Pailler who teaches English in a French school. Mr Pailler grew up in France, and is currently teaching in Le College Emile Lambert. Movie Review of Joker (2019)

When asking people about comic books. DC Comics is one of the first companies people can think of. With its creation in 1934, this titan of modern media has been behind the creation of many recognisable fictional figures in pop culture, from Superman, to The Flash and the focus of this review, The Joker and his character study presented in the 2019 movie named after him.

Joker is a film that takes a unique look on the Joker and his origin story, where instead of being a criminal who dove into chemicals which disfigured him, this movie instead looks at a man named Arthur Fleck and his spiralling descent into insanity thanks to the crumbling society of the late 1970's to early 1980's Gotham City.

The Clown Prince of Crime has been portrayed by several actors within the history of movies and television shows centred on Batman, all of which the portrayals were taken

extremely seriously by the actors and all portrayals were critically acclaimed. Joaquin Phoenix's portrayal is yet another amazing version of the Joker, showing us the descent of Arthur Fleck's sanity both through words and actions. Phoenix's spontaneous acting style is also a perfect fit for the Joker character, with behind the scenes footage showing how one simple change in how Phoenix performs a scene can drastically change the tone of the scene.

The cinematography of this film is also very well done, the camera angles tight and filled with detail that shows off the dreary and crumbling Gotham that Arthur Fleck lives in as well as the emotions of the characters.

Joker is a movie I would consider "a comic book movie for those not interested in comic books", it tells a story of a well-known comic book character in a unique

manner that doesn't rely on the viewer knowing anything about the characters origin prior to viewing, yet at the same time it gives fans of the franchise a new and interesting look at a character they've seen for years and grown to love.

It was a big day for the CPC senior boys soccer team on Friday as they took on Naas in the Midlands Division 1 soccer final in Newbridge Town's astro. They had battled hard through the various stages of the competition and were looking to leave with some silverware. Conditions weren't ideal for either team, with a strong wind blowing across the field. It was Naas who got off to the better start. forcing CPC keeper Rihards Matvejevs to make a brilliant save to keep CPC on level terms, after a powerful shot, which looked destined for the top corner. Naas controlled possession but were unable to break a solid CPC backline. Naas had a good chance which fell to number 8 but he was unable to capitalise and the ball went to the left and wide of the post. Naas dictated the flow of the game for the first 10 minutes not letting CPC get a look in. In the 14th

inute CPC finally strung a move together putting pressure on the Naas defence. A good cross was put in by Nathan O'Reilly which fell to Ruairi Conway. He looked set to fire CPC into the lead before he was tackled brilliantly by a Naas defender. In the 19th minute Naas got on top again with a good counter attack only stopped by Jake Murphy, who put it out for a corner. A minute later the Naas number 10 was through on goal for a 1 on 1 with Richard, only to drag his shot to the left and wide. In the 28th minute CPC worked their way up the pitch to win a free kick in a dangerous position. The ball was whipped in but was cleared by the Naas defence. It was in the 34th minute the highlight of the half occurred. Ruairi Brown gained possession deep in the CPC half before going on a run past multiple Naas defenders and into the box. His powerful shot hit the post and Naas visibly looked relieved. CPC remained on

top for the later stages of the half with Nathan coming close, before Ruairi went on another dangerous run into the Naas box, however the Naas defence dealt with it better this time. The half-time score was 0-0 which was a fair reflection of the game with Naas starting stronger and CPC ending the half on top.

The second half began and Naas CBS dominated the possession and the game, creating chances aplenty but they all ended up wide of the goal. Eleven minutes into the second half, Naas put together a beautiful piece of football, carving through the CPC defense, their striker receiving the ball on the edge of the box, picking his spot and firing the ball towards the goal, only to be saved yet again by CPC goalkeeper Rihard. CPC successfully weathered the Naas storm and started creating chances of their own. Their first shot of the half was taken by prolific striker Nathan O'Reilly when CPC produced a swift counter attack from a Naas corner,

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which forced the Naas keeper to pull off a diving save. CPC started to dominate the game from the 55th minute onwards creating even more clean cut chances, at this moment in the match only one team was looking likely to score and it wasn't CBS. They were holding out as well as they could, but it turned out this wasn't good enough to defend against a red hot CPC attack.

They created an overload in the attack which proved successful as Callum Bolton's shot from the edge of the box was tapped in by Adam Downes, after the keeper spilled it right into his path
